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What can we learn from this artefact?

What is it?

It is a stature of a cat.

Where do you think it might have been found?

It is made from wood.

Who might it have belonged to?

It probably belonged to someone rich because it is no something you would need in your daily life so it was a luxury.

I think it tells us that cats were important to the Ancient Egyptians because they wouldn't have made statues of them otherwise.



Plenary

Why is so much of our evidence about death and the wealthy?



Ordinary houses from Ancient Egyptian times do not still exist. Not only were they made of sun-dried bricks, so the chances of them surviving thousands of years were slim, their location in the Nile Valley was valuable so old homes were pulled down to make space for new ones.





Pyramids and tombs still exist because they were built out in the desert where people didn't need the space to build houses and they were built with stone.

This also explains why we know a lot more about death and the wealthy rather than the lives of ordinary people. Most of our evidence from that time was found inside the pyramids and tombs with the dead bodies of the kings and the rich elite.






