Sheffield City Council Critical Worker Criteria

Further to the guidance around critical workers and children who can access schools or educational settings we are providing settings with additional guidance to provide extra clarity. Our first priority continues to be vulnerable children in the city. After that, those families where both (or a single parent) are critical workers can attend school if required.

The purpose of this is to ensure that schools can work to safely meet demand where there is a risk that demand could exceed supply, and also to ensure that in that instance those with the greatest need are able to attend. We have prioritised the children of teaching staff in order to support as many children in the city as possible.

We have not included the definition of vulnerable pupils as all of our vulnerable pupils automatically receive a place and thus do not need to refer to this guidance or complete the second survey.

You will note that the prioritisation is based on **role** not employer.

Examples:

parent 1 is a paramedic, parent 2 is a GP= Priority 1

parent 1 is an electricity supply worker- single parent family = Priority 2

parent 1 is a vicar, parent 2 is none of the below= Priority 8
