Noel's Childhood

Noel was born in Ireland on 13th December 1967. As a child, Noel helped to care for the cattle and sheep on the family farm. Working on the farm was what inspired Noel's love of animals. He says that it is his destiny to care for them.



Noel studied **veterinary** science at the University College Dublin in Ireland and completed his training there in 1990. He then moved to England to carry out further specialist veterinary training.

In 2005, Noel opened his first animal hospital in Surrey, England. The hospital is called Fitzpatrick **Referrals** and it is one of the largest animal hospitals in the UK. Many people take their pets to Noel's hospital because their own vets can't care for them anymore. They hope that Noel and his team can solve their pets' complex problems. Noel is known for carrying out operations on animals' muscles and bones and he often gives injured pets new **bionic** legs. Not many other vets perform these operations. In 2015, Noel opened another special animal hospital to care for seriously ill pets.

Did You Know...?

Noel also trained to be an actor. He starred in films and TV programmes before choosing to focus on being a vet.

In 2010, Noel's work was entered into the Guinness Book of World Records when he gave a cat called Oscar two new bionic legs.

Noel is often called 'the bionic vet'.









Noel the Supervet

Since 2015, Noel has starred in the TV **documentary**, The Supervet. The show is filmed at Noel's hospital and shows the stories of owners as they look for specialist treatment for their pets' illnesses. Noel has performed many leg replacements on the show as well as many other complicated operations.



Noel also works as a university teacher in the veterinary department of the University of Surrey. In 2016, Noel met The Queen to discuss his work. He showed her some of the animals that had received bionic legs.

Noel believes that doctors and vets should work together more closely. He believes that some of his bionic work could also be used on humans. Noel has created a charity called The Humanimal Trust to try to encourage a closer relationship between human and animal care.

Noel Fitzpatrick is a prominent vet who is known for his innovative approach to veterinary surgery. He is famous for starring in the TV show called The Supervet.

Childhood

Noel was born on 13th December 1967. He grew up living on his family's farm in Laois, Ireland. As a child, Noel would help tend to the cattle and sheep on the farm. He formed a close bond with the family sheepdog, Pirate. On one occasion, Noel tried to save the life of a newborn lamb. Such experiences working with animals were what inspired Noel to want to become a vet. He has said that he feels that it is his destiny to care for animals.

Education

Noel was offered the chance to study to become either a human doctor or a vet at university. He opted to become a vet and studied veterinary science at the University College Dublin and, in 1990, he completed his studies there. Noel then moved to London and decided to pursue acting. He studied acting at Guildford College at the same time as completing his specialist veterinary training. Noel starred in a number of TV programmes and films before deciding to focus on being a vet.

Veterinary Career


Noel opened his first animal hospital in Surrey, England in 2005. The hospital, called Fitzpatrick **Referrals**, is one of the largest animal hospitals in the UK. Many owners take their pets to Fitzpatrick Referrals in the hope that Noel and his team can offer a solution to their pet's problems. Noel tries hard to save and prolong the lives of animals that other vets can't save. He is renowned for performing limb replacement surgery and uses state-of-the-art methods to provide injured pets with new **bionic** or **prosthetic** legs. Many of Noel's methods have never been attempted before.





In 2010, Noel provided a cat named Oscar with two new bionic legs. Oscar had suffered injuries to his legs as a result of a farm accident and was fitted with two new prosthetic legs by Noel and his team. Oscar was entered into the Guinness Book of World Records for being the first cat to be fitted with two bionic leg implants.

In 2015, Noel opened another special animal hospital to care for pets with life-threatening diseases.



Noel's TV programme, The Supervet, began in 2015 and follows Noel's experiences as a vet. The documentary features pet owners as they meet with Noel and his team in the hope of finding specialist treatment for their pets' conditions. Noel has performed many limb replacements on the show as well as many other complicated procedures. Such treatments have earned Noel the nickname 'the bionic vet'.

Noel's Other Work

In 2016, Noel met The Queen to discuss his work and show her some of the animals that had received prosthetic surgery. Noel is a university **professor** and works with veterinary students at the University of Surrey.

Noel believes that doctors and vets should collaborate more. He thinks that a lot of the work that he has been doing with animals, such as bionic limb replacements, can also be applied to humans. Noel's charity, The Humanimal Trust, aims to raise awareness and encourage research into treatments that can be used on both animals and people. He called this One Medicine.



bionic: Having a mechanical or electronic artificial body part.

professor: The highest level of teacher at a university.

prosthetic: Having an artificial body part.

referral: When a person or animal's care is passed on to a specialist.

Noel Fitzpatrick is an internationally-recognised veterinary surgeon who is known for his innovative and pioneering approach to orthopaedic (muscular and skeletal) surgery on animals. He stars in the TV documentary The Supervet and he is often referred to as 'the bionic vet'.

Childhood

Noel was born on 13th December 1967 and he grew up on his family's farm in Laois, Ireland. As a child, Noel was heavily involved with farm life and he spent time tending to the cattle and sheep. He often speaks of the close bond that he formed with the family sheepdog, Pirate. His experiences of working on a farm were what inspired Noel to become a vet and fed his desire to work with animals. One of his earliest memories was trying, in vain, to save the life of a lamb on his farm. He feels that it is his destiny to care for the animals in the world.



Education

Noel was offered places at university to study both human medicine or veterinary science; he was forced to choose between becoming a doctor or a vet. He opted for veterinary science and he studied at the University College Dublin. He completed his veterinary studies there in 1990. Following this, Noel moved to London and he decided to pursue another of his passions: acting. He studied acting at Guildford College while also completing further specialist veterinary training. Noel even starred in a number of TV programmes and films before deciding to focus his efforts on his veterinary career.

Veterinary Career

In 2005, Noel opened his first animal hospital, Fitzpatrick Referrals, in Surrey, England. Fitzpatrick Referrals is one of the largest animal hospitals in the world and they employ over 250 staff. Noel believes in the importance of compassionate care and he is passionate about finding innovative ways to treat animals that other vets can no longer care for.





Many see Fitzpatrick Referrals as the last chance for their pet and they hope that Noel and his team can offer a solution that their own vet can't offer. One of the main orthopaedic surgeries that Noel is famed for is limb replacement: he employs state-ofthe-art techniques to provide injured pets with new bionic (artificial mechanical) limbs, enabling them to walk when they may otherwise be unable to. Many of the techniques that Noel uses are unique and they have never been attempted before.

Noel's work was entered into the Guinness World Records in 2010 when he was the first person in the world to provide a cat with two bionic legs. Oscar the cat, who had suffered injuries to his legs as a result of a farm accident, was fitted with two new prosthetic legs by Noel and his team.

Noel is also passionate about prolonging the lives of animals that may otherwise not be saved. In 2015, Noel opened a specialist hospital to research and care for pets suffering from other serious medical conditions.





Noel began starring in his own TV documentary, The Supervet, in 2015. The show documents Noel's experiences as a vet and it follows the emotional stories of pets whose devoted owners are desperately seeking cutting-edge solutions to their animals' ailments. Many of the owners on the programme visit Noel in the hope of receiving new legs for their pet because he is known for his innovative use of prosthesis (using artificial body parts). Such treatments have earned Noel the nickname 'the bionic vet'. Noel has performed many limb replacements on the show as well as a number of other complex procedures.

Noel's Other Work

Noel is a university professor (a teacher of the highest rank) and he works with veterinary students at the University of Surrey where he is Professor of Orthopaedics.


In 2016, Noel was invited to meet The Queen to discuss his work and to show her some of the animals that had benefited from prosthetic surgery.

Noel believes strongly that there should be a closer collaboration between human and animal medicine. He thinks that much of the pioneering surgery and research that he has carried out on animals, such as bionic limb replacements, can also be applied to humans. Noel has founded a charity called The Humanimal Trust: he aims to help to raise awareness and encourage research into treatments that can be used on both animals and people. He calls this One Medicine.


