Euro 2020 (Summer 2021)

The Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) Euro 2020 football tournament will take place in June and July of 2021 across different European cities. The tournament has been rescheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Euros



The UEFA European Championship, commonly known as the Euros, is a football competition that is usually held every four years. Teams from across the continent compete to become the European champions. The last Euros were held in Paris in 2016 and the winning team was Portugal.

Host Cities



The Euros are usually held in one country. However, the year 2020 marked 60 years since the first Euro tournament so it was decided that the tournament would take place across different European cities. The host cities are:

- Amsterdam, the Netherlands
- Baku, Azerbaijan
- Bucharest, Romania
- Budapest, Hungary
- Copenhagen, Denmark
- Glasgow, Scotland
- London, England
- Munich, Germany
- Rome, Italy

The opening match will take place at the Stadio Olimpico in Rome. The semi-final matches and the final match will take place at Wembley Stadium in London. All other cities will host at least three matches.

Euro 2020 Teams

A total of 55 national teams played in **qualifying matches**. The best-performing 24 teams were then put into six groups for the finals. These are the groupings for the group stage:

Tournament Stages

During the first group stage of the tournament, each team plays against the other three members of the same group. The winners and runners-up from each group, along with four other teams, will progress to the next stage of the tournament, known as the round of 16. The winning eight teams from the round of 16 will then move to the quarter-finals, where the four highest-scoring teams will earn a place in the semi-finals.

The two remaining teams will meet at the final to compete for the highly regarded trophy.



Key Players

Each team has the chance to select the best of their nation's talent to compete as part of the national squad. It is considered a great honour to play for your nation's team and many of the best

footballers in the world will take part in the Euros. Some of the big names expected to take part in the tournament include: Kylian Mbappé (France), Phil Foden (England), Robert Lewandowski (Poland) and Kevin De Bruyne (Belgium).



Did You Know...?

Due to the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, the tournament was postponed for a year and the **capacity** of many of the stadiums has been reduced to allow for greater social distancing.

All 24 qualifying teams will receive at least €9.25m and the winning team could earn up to €34m.



capacity: The number of people that can be seated in a space, like a stadium.

qualifying matches: The games played in order to decide which team will progress to the final stages.

COVID-19

Due to the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, organisers were forced to postpone the Euro 2020 tournament until 2021 and many changes have been made to the traditional set-up. Kylian Mbappé: France

Kylian Mbappé is one of France's key players. He was considered to be a teenage prodigy and he has been footballing since he was a young child.



Kevin De Bruyne: Belgium

Kevin De Bruyne currently plays for Manchester City and is known for helping other members of his team to score goals (known as goal assists).



Phil Foden: England

Manchester City player, Phil Foden, rose to fame after playing a key role in the squad that won the U-17 (under 17s) World Cup in 2017.



Robert Lewandowski: Poland

Robert Lewandowski has scored over 40 goals for FC Bayern Munich and is Poland's all-time top goalscorer.

Tournament Stages

Kylian Mbappé: France

Kylian Mbappé is one of France's key squad members. He was hailed as a teenage prodigy and he has been honing his football skills since the age of six.



Phil Foden: England

Manchester City player, Phil Foden, rose to fame after playing a key role in the squad that won the U-17 (under 17s) World Cup in 2017.



Kevin De Bruyne: Belgium

The midfielder, Kevin De Bruyne, currently plays for Manchester City and is known for his impressive number of goal assists (helping other members of his team to score goals).



Robert Lewandowski: Poland

Robert Lewandowski has scored over 40 goals for his club, FC Bayern Munich, and is Poland's all-time top goalscorer.
