



Longest Day of the Year: Summer Solstice 2021

In the northern **hemisphere**, the summer solstice is nearly upon us!

In the UK, the 21st June is the day of the year which has more sunlight hours than all the rest.



It happens because the Earth is slightly tilted. At this time of year, the North Pole is leaning its most towards the Sun.

So, the further north you go, the more sunshine you get.

In Madrid, they'll be getting just over 15 hours of daylight on the 21st. Further north, in London, they'll have over 16 and a half hours of sunlight.

But up in Fairbanks, Alaska, they'll be enjoying nearly 22 hours of sunlight!

In fact, to celebrate the summer solstice in Fairbanks - and make use of all that daylight - they hold the Midnight Sun baseball game.

In the Tirol region of Austria, they celebrate by lighting bonfires on the mountaintops.

Ancient cultures **honoured** the solstice too. If you stand in front of the ancient Egyptian

Why is it only the summer solstice in the northern hemisphere?

- Because the tilt of the Earth means that the seasons are reversed in the northern and southern hemispheres.
- When it's summer in the northern hemisphere, it's winter in the southern hemisphere. Six months later, when it's winter in the northern hemisphere, it's summer in the southern hemisphere.

monument the Sphinx, you'll see the Sun set precisely between two of the pyramids.

Stonehenge was also built thousands of years ago, yet those stones were placed to **align** with the Sun too.
