Final Easing of Lockdown Rules in **England Delayed**

The final step in relaxing lockdown rules in England has been delayed for four weeks.

More people in England have been catching coronavirus recently. So, Prime Minister Boris Johnson said that "it is sensible to wait just a little longer."

How is the UK COVID-19 vaccination programme going?

- In the UK, more than 40 million people (over three-quarters of all adults) have received at least one dose of a vaccine!

The government has been following their four-step 'roadmap' out of lockdown. At each of the first three steps, more rules were lifted and more things went back to normal.

It was hoped that next Monday would be the beginning of step four. It would have meant everything in England opening back up again fully. Some people were calling it 'freedom day'.

But, the prime minister has said it'll have to wait until 19th July.

The delay means that rules on social distancing will continue. That means people still have to wear face coverings and limit indoor meetings to six people.

Cinemas, museums, and play areas all remain open. As do theme parks, libraries and theatres. But, there will still be limits on the numbers of people allowed in these places at one time.

Boris Johnson did say there was the "possibility of proceeding to Step 4 and full opening sooner" if it was safe to do so.

So, fingers crossed people in England won't have to wait much longer for 'freedom day'.
