## Fronted Adverbial

An adverbial is a word or phrase that adds detail to a verb. (Tip: it adds to the verb. Ad-verb!)

Adverbials are used to explain how, where or when something happened; they are like adverbs made up of more than one word.

Fronted adverbials are 'fronted' because they appear at the front of the sentence, before the verb.

Fronted adverbials are <u>single words or phrases</u> at the beginning of a sentence, used to describe the action that follows.
