The Purpose of a Newspaper Report



Newspaper reports are a recount of an event or events that have happened. Newspapers want to sell as many copies as they can. Therefore, they will try and find the most interesting stories for their readers. The front page is where you will find the lead story.

Journalists will follow a lead- from a source- on a story, then report it if they think it is something their readers would be interested in. They get quotes from people involved and write the story, usually accompanied by a photograph. Journalists write in a way that holds the reader's attention, sometimes telling more than one side of a story.

Stories are given attention-grabbing headlines that are intended to attract buyers. Editors have the final say on which stories are published and what the lead story will be.

Newspapers are normally published daily and weekly.
